

Health Records and Privacy

Course Description

The Health Records and Privacy course focuses on healthcare records legislation, most importantly, the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act (HIPAA). The course presents an overview of HIPAA and then discusses the Privacy Rule and what information must be safeguarded under the legislation. It also covers remedies for unauthorized disclosures, record retention policies, and requirements for healthcare providers.

Course Learning Outcomes

At the completion of this course, students will be able to:

- Discuss HIPAA, its purposes and its most commonly applied features and rules;
- Apply the "Privacy Rule" under HIPAA to given pieces of information;
- Describe the mechanisms by which HIPAA can be enforced through lawsuits and administrative actions;
- Differentiate the roles of the federal and state governments in health records regulation;
- Describe the minimum required medical records retention policies applicable under federal law.

Final Exam

Grades and credit recommendations are based solely on a final exam. When students are ready to take the final exam, they should register for a LawShelf account (or simply log in, for those with existing accounts). Go to the video-course page and click "Take the Final Exam" and pay the exam fee, where applicable. Students will be given instructions on how to take the exam. All exams are proctored by the Voice Proctor® proctoring system. An overview of the system is provided here and it requires no training or learning curve. Grades of 70% or above are considered passing grades and qualify for recommended transfer credit.

The final exam is based on the video course modules. Additional resources detailed in this syllabus are helpful for background and for building greater understanding of the course materials. Case Studies

Many LawShelf video courses include case studies. These do not necessarily teach new material but are meant to demonstrate how the materials covered in the course are applied by various courts. Concepts covered in the case studies are covered on the final exam, so make sure to watch the case studies before taking the exam. However, it is unnecessary to memorize the facts and details of the cases covered in these case studies.

Self-Quizzes

Video-course modules and case studies feature self-quizzes that consist of practice questions on the materials covered in the videos. These questions are presented for the benefit of the student and are important to review before taking the final exam because they are similar in style and substance to the questions on the final exam. These quizzes are not graded or monitored and there is no record of how students answer these questions. Students may answer these questions as many times as they like and are encouraged to keep re-taking the quizzes until they have mastered all the questions.
