

Vicarious Liability

Course Description

This course looks at the circumstances under which a person or organization can be held liable for the actions of another. The course focuses on vicarious liability of an employer for torts committed by an employee. It also looks at vicarious liability of parents, contractors, and other responsible parties.

Course Learning Outcomes

At the completion of this course, students will be able to:

- Determine when a parent may be liable for their child's torts;
- Identify the non-delegable duties that an employer may be vicariously liable for if there is misconduct by an independent contractor;
- Determine whether a person should be categorized as an employee or independent contractor;
- Pinpoint the situations in which a hospital may be vicariously liable for its employees' misconduct, and when a bar or restaurant may be liable for a server's conduct;
- Distinguish between compensatory and punitive damages;
- Differentiate between the defenses of assumption of the risk, comparative negligence, and sovereign immunity.
- Understand and apply the concept of proximate cause.
- Identify when a bailor-bailee relationship exists and the consequences of such a relationship.

Final Exam

Grades and credit recommendations are based solely on a final exam. When students are ready to take the final exam, they should register for a LawShelf account (or simply log in, for those with existing accounts). Go to the video-course page and click "Take the Final Exam" and pay the exam fee, where applicable. Students will be given instructions on how to take the exam. All exams are proctored by the Voice Proctor® proctoring system. An overview of the system is <u>provided here</u> and it requires no training or learning curve. Grades of 70% or above are considered passing grades and qualify for recommended transfer credit.

Students may answer these questions as many times as they like and are encouraged to keep re-taking the quizzes until they have mastered all the questions.
